

Lansing Lamont is a 35-year-old Washington correspondent for *Time* Magazine. As a member of *Time's* Washington Bureau, he spent three years from 1961 to 1964 covering atomic energy affairs. During that period he reported several cover stories on the Atomic Energy Commission, the United States series of nuclear tests in the Pacific and the status of nuclear weaponry in America. Before joining *Time*, Lamont was a reporter for the *Washington Star* and a correspondent on Capitol Hill for a number of New England papers. In the course of researching this book, he interviewed more than one hundred scientists and military officers who participated in the Trinity test, traveled to some fifteen cities and universities across the country to get his material, and spent two days dragooning the Army and Air Force into letting him visit the Trinity site. Lamont graduated from Milton Academy, Harvard College and the Columbia School of Journalism. A native New Yorker, he moved to Washington in 1958 following three years in the Army, where he served as an infantry officer. He and his wife and four children live in the Northwest section of Washington, D.C., where the only fallout is political.
